The Australian Journal of Rural Health is recognised as Australia's premier multidisciplinary academic journal on rural and remote health. It has an impact factor of 1.070 (ISI Web of Science). The AJRH is owned by the National Rural Health Alliance and is also the official journal of CRANaplus and SARRAH.

Aims and scope

AJRH provides high quality original research articles and other material (short reports, book reviews) focused on rural and remote health. Editorial policies of AJRH recognise and support the multi-disciplinary realities of health work in non-metropolitan areas.

AJRH is published six times a year, both in hardcopy and online, by Wiley-Blackwell and is circulated to national and international subscribers. It is listed in global bibliographic databases including ISI Web of Science, Medline, and other major abstracting and indexing services.

Ownership and management

AJRH is owned and managed by the National Rural Health Alliance (NRHA). The Honorary Editor is Associate Professor David Perkins, Director, Centre for Remote Health Research Broken Hill Department of Rural Health, Sydney University.
